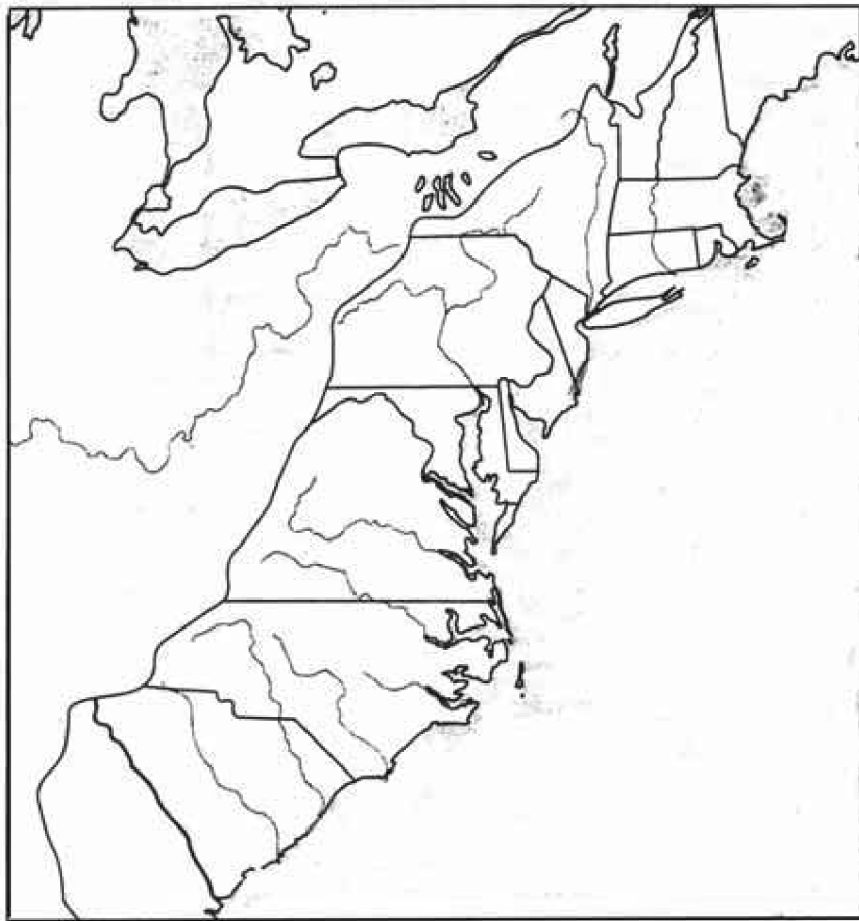


MAP EXERCISE**ENGLAND'S NORTH AMERICAN COLONIES IN 1700**

By 1700, the English had been settled in North America for nearly a century and had established twelve separate colonies along the East Coast. France settled to the north and west, and Spain to the south and west. Stretched along a vast and varied terrain, the English colonies developed regional peculiarities in their cultures, social rituals, politics, and relationships with the mother country. In addition to the English, French, and Spanish, many millions of Native Americans lived along the eastern seaboard and had lived there long before the European's arrival.

**MAPPING AMERICA**

1. Label: New York, Massachusetts, South Carolina, East and West Jersey, Maryland, Connecticut, North Carolina, Delaware, Rhode Island, Pennsylvania, New Hampshire, Virginia, Georgia.
2. Locate by placing a dot, then label: Jamestown, Boston, Philadelphia, Providence, Salem, Charleston, Newport, New York City, Plymouth, Williamsburg.
3. Label: Cape Cod, Long Island, Chesapeake Bay, Connecticut River, Delaware River, Potomac River, James River, Hudson River, Susquehanna River.
